His program was as follows: Haydn, Variations, F minor; Beethoven, 32 Variations, C minor; Dandrieu-Godowsky, Caprice; Loellly-Godowsky, Gigue; Scarlatti-Tausig, Passtarello; Chopin, Etude; Strauss, Two Waltzes; Volckers of the Forest and One Lives Only Once; Rachmannoff, Polka-Melodie, Melodie, Humoresque, Three Preludes (G sharp major, D flat, and B minor); Liszt, Hungarian Rhapsody No. 2. There was a large audience.

PROF. W.C. SABINE SCIENTIST, DIES

Former Dean of Lawrence Scientific School Had Long Been Ill

WAS MEMBER OF HARVARD FACULTY

Prof. Wallace Clement Sabine, formerly dean of the Lawrence Scientific school, and a member of the Harvard faculty since 1889, died yesterday at his home, 1318 Marlboro street. Although he had not been in good health for some time, the malady which occasioned his death had developed recently.

BORN AND EDUCATED IN OHIO

He was born in Richwood, O., June 13, 1858, the son of Hylas and Anna (Ware) Sabine. He was educated the Ohio State University, Columbus, receiving the degree of A. B. in 1880. He then entered the graduate department of Harvard and received the degree of A. M. in 1888.
