

# Rachmaninoff and Bauer to Give Recitals Here This Week; Vienna Singers This Afternoon

**S**ERGEI VASSILIEVITCH RACHMANINOFF will be in Cleveland tomorrow night, and his host of admirers will flock to Music Hall where the veteran Russian composer-pianist will appear in recital. The coming of such a distinguished virtuoso marks a red letter day in the music annals of the city.

With Beethoven's "Appassionata," one of Rachmaninoff's own sonatas, and a long list of favorite song transcriptions and smaller piano pieces, the program holds interest for music-lovers of a wide variety of tastes. Rachmaninoff is being brought here under the auspices of the Philharmonic Concert Company.

and sometimes perturbed land of modernism. Songs by Shoenberg, for instance, to be sung by Martha Lawrence, are selected from his early and more conventional period, though they contain already the germs of his more advanced style.

William Newman, pianist, will play Bloch's "Poems of the Sea," and other numbers by Scriabin, Prokofief and Jahnacht. With Bernard Goodman, violinist, and Douglas Marsh, cellist, Newman will also play Ravel's Trio in A minor. Martha Lawrence, accompanied by Mrs. Harry L. Goodbread, will conclude the program with songs by Santoliquido, Bloch, Debussy and Alexander Georges.
