

RACHMANINOFF IS HERE FOR RECITAL

Russian Genius Will Be Greeted by Large Audience at the Armory Tonight.

Sincerity and independence characterize Sergei Rachmaninoff, Russia's greatest composer-pianist, who is the guest of Duluth today and who will play at the Armory tonight as the next attraction on Mrs. George S. Richards' All-Star course. Rachmaninoff arrived in Duluth yesterday and devoted the day to rest at the Spalding, after arduous travel.

A News Tribune reporter found him reticent in manner, strikingly different from the typical Russian artist in that his hair is cut short, and with absolutely no self-glorification. "I play the way I think the masters intended their music should be played," he said. "It is of no consequence that others think their interpretations better. I play for the heart—the heart is all, everything."

The concert tonight, last but one of the series, is anticipated eagerly by Duluth and range music-lovers. Since the days of Rubinstein and those later but none the less vanished triumphs of Paderewski, Duluth has had no such opportunity as this to hear one of the world's recognized masters. A capacity audience is expected.
