

Prelude Is On Rachmaninoff Program Here

Those people who have been holding their breath for fear the noted Prelude in C Sharp Minor by Rachmaninoff would not appear among the numbers on his program, can draw a deep sigh of relief. It is there. The program for Rachmaninoff's concert Wednesday evening might correctly be termed popular. This word is associated so strongly in most people's minds, however, with the current "jazz" that it may be misconstrued.

The heaviest number, used in beginning the program, is Beethoven's Sonata Op. 31. This is a sonata of the classic form in three movements. Mendelssohn's Rondo Capriccioso comes second, and is a very brilliant number. (Those people who remember the former Jubilee's held here annually may recall this particular number—it having been played one time by 47 applicants.)

A Chopin groupe is included in the program; Valse Faust by Liszt-Gounod; and three numbers by the composer, among which is the prelude by which he is known. The program follows:
