The acute disorganization which followed immediately on the outbreak of the great strike on the French railways appears to have assumed in some degree, this morning, a more settled character.

The strike itself may collapse at any moment, but at present there is no sign of such a development; while the strong measures to which the Government have resorted indicate the serious view it takes of the situation.

A considerable number of strikers called up as military reservists were at work yesterday, but the leaders have refused to accept military law, though at various meetings resistance of the mobilisation order was denounced.

So far as the actual running of trains was concerned, the situation seemed much improved yesterday, but the political and labour problems involved seem no nearer solution.

Besides the difficulties of British travellers to and from France, and the congestion of goods on the Channel ports, the Postoffice has had to bear the weight of many foreign mails in order to avoid delay on the French railways.

Several of the strikers have been arrested, and the Government are making every effort to induce others to strike.
